As we look forward to the warmer days of spring, we also look back to reflect on the accomplishments of the past year at the Lied Center for Performing Arts.






#### 2023 Membership Campaign


# Friends of Lied & Circles of Giving - Together at Last!

The Lied Center has historically offered two membership programs for individuals who support the arts through annual gifts: Friends of Lied for contributions of \$50 - \$3,000 and Circles of Giving for contributions over \$3,000. Each program contained a separate benefit structure, and contributions were made to two separate organizations.

To better serve our members, we are unifying these programs under the Friends of Lied umbrella starting in 2024. #### 2024 Friends of Lied Gala

The annual Lied fundraiser is always a highly anticipated event. This year the Friends of Lied board transformed the Lied Center into the city that never sleeps for New York, New York. On Feb. 10, 400 guests enjoyed an unforgettable evening featuring the sights of the city and the sounds of Broadway. During the dinner program, guests learned about the lives that have been impacted by the work of the Lied Center, with Dr. Lawrence Chatters serving as emcee. Following dinner and the exhilarating live auction, guests could enjoy the music of Broadway by star Franc D'Ambrosio, best known for the playing the lead role in The Phantom of the Opera more than 2,100 times. Or they could travel through the city to dance the night away at Studio 54 in the Carson Theater, with DJ Chatters spinning classic hits under the glitter of a disco ball.

## Kinetic Light Brings Fresh Perspective to Dance and Accessibility

Kinetic Light was a thrilling addition to the Lied Center's season that had a lasting impact on the community. As an internationally recognized disability arts ensemble, Kinetic Light illuminates the intersectional creative force emerging from dance, disability culture, and accessibility. From January 22-27, 2024, the company was in residence, leading five separate outreach events, as well as presenting a public performance of their work Descent.

On Monday, January 22, Annie Wiegand, the only Deaf professional lighting designer in the United States and recent addition to the Kinetic Light team, led an hour-long lighting lecture with University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL) students. Wiegand discussed her career path, challenges, ableism, and audism in the lighting industry, and shared advice to ensure accessibility for deaf technicians. Students were grateful for Annie's sharing of her time and experience. One attendee noted, "Annie opened our world to understanding how being a deaf lighting designer works. It was fascinating to hear her experience in creating art with light." This lecture served 11 students and faculty members.

Also on January 22, Alice Sheppard, founder and artistic director of Kinetic Light, and Laurel Lawson, company choreographer, engineer, and dancer, led a dance master class with a community youth dance group, Dancing Beyond Limits. This dance group includes disabled students who are pursuing their love for dance. Sheppard and Lawson utilized collaboration and movement vocabulary to explore and teach Kinetic Light's partnering technique. The class volunteers also took valuable knowledge away from this master class. "I learned different ways and approaches to teach dance classes to young students with disabilities." This event served 15 community students and adults.

On Tuesday, January 23, Sheppard and Lawson led a dance master class for UNL dance students in the Carson Theater. The artists instructed students in different partnering techniques and emphasized the importance of access in the performing arts. This master class emphasized experiencing choreography through the lens of nonvisual, neurodiverse, or Deaf audiences. The class had 16 students in attendance.

A panel discussion was held with members of Kinetic Light and university community leaders on January 24. Panelists include Sheppard, Lawson, Assistant Vice Chancellor of Inclusive Leadership and Learning Dr. Jennifer PeeksMease, PhD Communication Studies student Renca Dunn, and moderator Barbara Woodhead, the Director of Services for Students with Disabilities. Kinetic Light's residency fell during the University of Nebraska-Lincoln's commemoration of Martin Luther King Jr. Week; with Kinetic Light's focus on intersectional identities and access, the panel was a natural fit for the week's activities. This event was open to the UNL and Lincoln community and had 35 students and adults in attendance.

Lastly, Kinetic Light hosted an event and hospitality training session for Lied Center staff. They shared their practices and philosophy surrounding access. Training also covered actionable steps to create accessible and equitable performing arts venues. This training was led by Lawson and Sheppard and served 40 adults.

In total, Kinetic Light served 117 members of the UNL and Lincoln communities through outreach events, in addition to the over 600 audience members who attended Descent on January 27. Their knowledge and perspective in the realms of art, design, technology, dance, and accessibility helped to educate and inspire those who took part in the week.
