The Lied Center is proud to be among the first major performing arts centers in the nation to reopen. We began welcoming patrons back in July with socially distanced seating. Our current capacity in the main hall is a little over 500 seats. The audience is perfectly spread out and the live acoustics provide a vibrant arts experience. We've upgraded our air filters based on CDC recommendations, and have the maximum amount of fresh air circulating in the building. We also require facial coverings for everyone who enters the building. So here's to safely and joyfully returning to the Lied!

The Lied Center is continuing to provide arts education experiences on our Facebook page and website. We are also in the process of developing technology to share broadcast-quality viewing of select Lied Center performances. Please make sure you are receiving our e-mails in your in-box to find out about all the opportunities available!

The ticket and facility staff, along with the Lied administration, deserve our thanks for the work they have done to comply with all the necessary requirements to keep us safe as we open the season. I also want to acknowledge the outstanding work done by Bill and the Lied staff to produce Lied Live!, the two summer intensives for students and the traveling neighborhood concerts, all the while reconstructing the season performance schedule.

Although everything is different, some things remain the same. The Friends board has been meeting virtually since March. Our annual retreat was held on September 9. The day included a presentation from Liz Lange, a philanthropy consultant. And plans began taking shape for our annual events. Pre-performance dinners are planned for spring of 2021. And the fundraiser traditionally held in the spring is still in the beginning stages. Please stay tuned!

At a time when the only certainty has been uncertainty, we appreciate each of you who have renewed your membership or became a new member this year. Membership totals in August were at more than 94 percent of where we were a year ago and 86 percent of last year's gift. WELCOME BACK TO THE LIED!

The experience may be different than in the past, but live performances have returned to the Lied Center!

When the curtain rises on the 2020-2021 season at the Lied, it will have been a full six months since COVID-19 began forcing the cancellation of events in March. In that time, we've been working to make sure that returning to the Lied would be the safest experience possible.

As the Lied reopens, we're making the following commitments to health and safety:

- All shows at the Lied through at least January 16, 2021 will feature socially-distanced seating, dramatically reducing the capacity of the auditorium. Most seats will be available in pairs, with a distance of six feet between each group of seats.
- There will be increased cleaning and disinfecting that meets or exceeds University and health department guidance.
- The Lied has joined with UNL in requiring that face coverings be worn inside any campus building, including the theater.
- The Lied is adopting more comprehensive ticket flexibility than ever before. In an effort to encourage patrons who are feeling ill or have been exposed to someone who is ill to stay home, the Lied is making all tickets fully refundable, right up until show time.
- If a show is postponed or canceled, patrons will be offered the choice of keeping the value of their tickets as on-account credit to be used for another show or receiving a full refund.

In addition, Lied staff has been busy making improvements and modifications to the building that will also help in providing the safest possible patron experience. New touchless sinks and soap dispensers have been installed which, when added to the existing touchless toilets and paper towel dispensers, make the Lied restrooms entirely touch-free. New electrostatic sprayers approved by the EPA have been purchased for use in disinfecting surfaces between shows, and the building's fresh air intake has been increased, as have the ratings of Lied Center air filters.

Though this will be a unique season, it will also be an especially joyful one! Perhaps now more than ever before, we're celebrating the opportunity to be together to be entertained and inspired by great art. We are so thankful you'll be with us as the curtain rises on another exceptional season at the Lied!

This solo concert will highlight this dynamic and passionate performer whose career has also included starring as Mufasa in the U.S. tour of Disney's *The Lion King* and leading performances on Broadway in *The Lion King* and *Carousel*. Most recently, he starred as Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in Opera Carolina's production of *I Dream*, a rhythm and blues musical about the final 36 hours of Dr. King's life.

On Saturday, October 17, 2020, Davis brings that prowess, strength, and magic back to the Lied Center for two performances only. It's sure to be an unforgettable event with this world class performer!

LIED LEARNING ONLINE

No one could have predicted how quickly all of our lives would change in early March, and the Lied Center's education staff found themselves facing the challenge of creating meaningful content and opportunities in the online atmosphere. Over the summer, the Lied's education department has been hard at work launching Lied Learning Online, a new series of online content with programs aimed at educating theatre lovers of all ages.

The first program in the series, the video podcast *Lunch & Learn*, offers an in-depth look at the arts scene in Lincoln and the arts industry as a whole. Our inaugural *Lunch & Learn* episode in June, centering on the musical *Hamilton*, averaged 90 real time viewers and has reached over 2,000 views on Facebook after its broadcast.

For our smallest patrons, we launched *Tiny Lieders*, a series of early childhood arts workshops, with the help of Kerfuffle, a theater company which focuses on producing arts experiences for young children. *Tiny Lieders* takes families on imagination adventures into outer space, under the sea, and on trips to the farm, all from the comfort of their living rooms!

In addition to cultivating talent, the Lied Learning Online series offers a stage to local talent with *Huskers in the Spotlight*, which showcases original work from current students and alumni from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

The Lied's education staff has also been hard at work on the *Master Classes @ The Lied* series, which offers middle and high school students from across Nebraska the opportunity to hone their craft via Zoom. Thus far, Lied teaching artists have offered classes on the topics of song interpretation and dialects.

The Lied is committed to bringing meaningful programming to our patrons in any format in these unusual times. Love for the arts can break through any barrier!

SUMMER CAMPS: LIED CENTER TRIPLE THREAT BROADWAY INTENSIVE AND PIANO ACADEMY

When the Lied temporarily shut its doors in early March, one of the first questions our education department faced was what to do about our summer camps. It was quickly decided that we were committed to offering these experiences to Nebraska's brightest young talents in a time when many opportunities were being canceled. The conversation then shifted to how we could effectively and safely transfer an in-person camp to Zoom. We proudly hosted both the *Lied Center Triple Threat Broadway Intensive* and *Piano Academy* digitally in June and July, respectively.

The second annual *Lied Center Triple Threat Broadway Intensive* served thirty of Nebraska's future Great White Way stars. Instructors Allison Macri, Con O'Shea-Creal, Sam Hartley, and Tony Award winner Jason Michael Webb guided students through indepth dance, acting, and singing master classes over the five-day program. Students were given the chance to learn group choreography, sharpen their audition songs and monologues, and participate in mini-sessions about next steps in a theatre career. For students like Robbie Exstrom from Kearney, it wasn't just about building skills, but connecting with the artistic community during COVID-19, saying *LCTTBI* made him, "feel less alone, especially in this time with the pandemic, being self-isolated. Feeling like you're part of a community is important right now." Instructors, students, and facilitators were able to learn from each other, create connections, and share their performance gifts virtually during the 2020 *LCTTBI*.

Piano Academy included thirteen of the nation's most talented young pianists, a camp attendance record. Going digital for this camp had some advantages, including the ability to welcome participants from Oregon and Texas for the first time in the camp's history. Campers were coached on proper technique, the ongoing changes in the piano performance industry, entrepreneurship, and how to be a better overall pianist from instructors Dr. Eric Zuber, an internationally renowned pianist and featured artist for this year's *Piano Academy*, UNL Glenn Korff School of Music faculty Dr. Paul Barnes, and nationally certified teacher and performer Donna Gunn.

We are eager to gather in person for these camps in the future, but were thrilled to be able to continue to offer these virtual opportunities to students to share their passions and practice their crafts safely during COVID-19.

MOSAIC at the Lied: Making a Difference From a Distance!

The MOSAIC Series at the Lied is dedicated to art and experiences that are idea-driven, curiosity fueled, and radically inclusive, and a large part of that mission involves connecting artists with students and other community members in innovative and meaningful ways. While current health conditions prevent those kinds of interactions from taking place in person, the Lied's education and outreach team has developed an innovative lineup of virtual events.

Step Afrika! had been scheduled to perform at the Lied in early September, but COVID-19 caused the cancellation of their entire 2020 tour. Still, this unforgettable group remained an integral part of this year's MOSAIC events. UNL percussion students were able to learn from Step Afrika's former artistic director, Jakari Sherman, through a virtual lecture and demonstration of Step Afrika's distinctive percussive style. Community and UNL dance students attended a virtual master class with members of Step Afrika's company, learning about the African American tradition of stepping. On September 9th, the experiences culminated in a free screening of Step Afrika's film *STONO*, which marks the anniversary of the largest rebellion of enslaved African Americans in US history. The film, which was co-commissioned by the Lied Center and was shown to a socially distanced audience in the main hall, was followed by a virtual discussion panel of artists and scholars from around the country.
