Community Engagement

The Bill T. Jones/Arnie Zane Company was in residence February 24-27 with their piece What Problem?, which engaged 29 community dancers from the UNL and broader Lincoln communities and 21 singers from the UNL a cappella groups the Bathtub Dogs and Boots & Cats, as well as a student conductor from the Glenn Korff School of Music. Community members participated in two community meals with the company, three days of rehearsal, and the performance on the Mainstage February 27 at 7:30 PM. The Lied Center also hosted a public town hall entitled The Future We See, A Town Hall, which had over 75 attendees, on the topic of isolation in Additionally, modern Lincoln. two dance masterclasses with the company were hosted by UNL dance classes.

Man Behind the Name: **Ernst F. Lied**

Have you ever wondered about the Ernst Lied, the namesake of our performing arts center? Ernst F. Lied was born in Columbus, Ohio, in 1906. His family then moved to Kansas City, where he graduated high school. A self-proclaimed less-than-average student, he attended the University of Kansas, then ultimately graduated from the University of Nebraska in 1927.

When his family moved to Omaha, he opened the Lied Buick dealership on his own. During the war, he pivoted his career by opening Lied Precision Tool which made wing nuts and other parts for wartime fighter planes. Once the war was over, he resumed selling Buicks until he decided the Buick was no longer a quality car. In 1958, he sold his dealership and set his sights on Las Vegas.

He chose the burgeoning desert town because he had traveled there with his mother and thought it was similar to Omaha and had the potential for growth. There he built a housing development of 79 homes, a shopping center, and a 100-unit motel on the new Vegas strip. He continued buying up real estate based on where power lines were. In his lifetime, Ernst only sold one piece of land, just to prove to his friends back in Omaha that he hadn't lost his mind!

We will forever be grateful for Mr. Lied's ingenuity and business acumen.


Mark Moore-Associate Director of Event and Facility Services




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
