Aladdin Outreach Took
Lincolnites to
A Whole New World
in October!



In more ways than one, Disney's Aladdin was an inspirational and magical addition to the beginning of the Lied's season. On stage, the company showed us an entrancing performance with elaborate visuals and brilliant composition during their eight-show series Oct. 3-8. Off the stage, the members of Aladdin gave just as much energy and inspiration to our community through six outreach events. From conversations on diversity and inclusion with UNL students to engaging with LPS elementary students, they were able to serve people of many diverse backgrounds and interests.

Cast members J. Andrew Speas and Ben Chavez spoke at an OASIS Dish It Up segment held at the Jackie Gaughan Multicultural Center. During this talk, they spoke on the ways they show up as diversity, equity, and inclusion ambassadors on the road and opened up about their journeys as artists. This event served 32 UNL students, faculty, and staff members.

Ensemble and main cast members Colt Prattes and Angelina Mullin held an Artist Q&A for an Introduction to Theatre class, with other performing arts students invited to attend. They were able to speak life into the generation of young artists who are steadily approaching their own careers. There were 168 UNL students in attendance.

The Genie, Marcus M. Martin, and cast member Jake Letts spoke at Clinton Elementary for an all-school assembly Q&A session serving 500 Lincoln Public School students. Many students shared regards of not being interested in theatre prior to the assembly but through seeing the passion in these actors, left with a newfound interest in the art of performing.

Assistant stage manager, Emily White-Winter, spoke in an intimate gathering with 8 UNL stage management students. Through this, students were able to visualize their careers in real time, and gain visibility on what it takes to work behind the scenes on major productions like Aladdin.

The show's Sultan, Sorab Wadia, facilitated a vocal master class for UNL vocal performance students at music convocation, attended by all UNL music majors. Wadia's feedback was meaningful, giving students an opportunity to refine their technique and gain skills to carry for a lifetime. This event served 250 students.

Cast members Dwelvan David and Taylor Mackenzie Smith facilitated a musical theatre workshop with singing and dancing instruction. Sweeping the class into the land of Agrabah through song and dance, this master class walked participants through the dance and music for the show's opening number, "Arabian Nights." There were 19 UNL students and 9 LPS students in attendance.

In all, Aladdin outreach events served **over 1,000 members** of the Lincoln community and left a lasting impact during their brief visit.


From Scottsbluff to Nebraska City: Arts Across Nebraska tours O Pioneers! and Mariachi Zapata

This fall, Arts Across Nebraska, a Lied education program that tours the state offering arts education opportunities and public performances to rural populations, visited seven communities over the course of two tours, traveling over 1,400 miles and serving 3,635 Nebraskans in just 12 tour days!

In a first of its kind collaboration with UNL Opera, Arts Across Nebraska co-presented UNL professor Tyler Goodrich White's O Pioneers!, an operatic retelling of the classic Willa Cather novel recounting life on the prairie. Directed by William Shomos, O Pioneers! played three public performances and three educational student matinees Oct. 13-20 in the communities of Scottsbluff, McCook, and Red Cloud. Many teachers commented on the impact of the experience for their students, noting the value of seeing a live orchestra, hearing operatic singing performed for the first time, and the high-quality performance by those on stage. Students appreciated the opportunity to ask the cast questions post-show and connect with the performers. The production featured UNL students and Glenn Korff School of Music graduates as actors, pit members, and technicians, with White conducting the sextet of live musicians. In total, over 735 members of the Scottsbluff, McCook, and Red Cloud communities were served by the O Pioneers! tour.

The second tour of this season took Mariachi Zapata, an Omaha-based mariachi ensemble and Omaha Entertainment Award winner, to the communities of Fremont, Nebraska City, Grand Island, and Kearney. The group performed three public performances, five student matinees and conducted four outreaches with area students between November 14-17. Ninety percent of audience survey respondents enjoyed the show and felt they had a greater appreciation of mariachi music after watching the public performance. The performances were highly engaging and interactive, with some audience members getting the opportunity to participate in the show through dancing and singing on stage with the group. Mariachi Zapata had incredible turnout with nearly 2,900 members of the Fremont, Nebraska City, Grand Island, and Kearney areas being served by performances and outreach!

Friends of Lied board members attended events in Scottsbluff, McCook, Red Cloud, Fremont, Nebraska City, and Grand Island. Led by Education Chair Nancy Brosz, members had a table in the lobby and provided information to communities about the work the Lied Center does, benefits of Friends of Lied membership, and shared candy and stickers with audience members.
